
The page is not read. The service begins with a song, "Once in Royal David's City on the next page.

NARRATOR 2:

The First Lesson: The promise of a redeemer was present from the beginning

The story of Christmas really begins in the Book of Genesis.

In this passage,

the works of the devil are seen in the actions of the *snake* who is tempting human beings

to turn against God.

And Jesus Christ himself can be seen in this story, in the *offspring* of the woman.

So taken together

this passage can be understood to be the very first promise of a Redeemer for a sinful mankind.

Lois Weber:

A reading from the book of Genesis.

Now the snake was

the most cunning of all the wild animals that the LORD God had made. He asked the woman,

"Did God really say,

'You shall not eat from any of the trees in the garden'?"

The woman answered the snake:

"We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden;

it is only about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden that God said,

'You shall not eat it or even touch it, or else you will die.""

But the snake said to the woman:

"You certainly will not die!

God knows well that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, who know good and evil."

The woman saw that the tree was good for food and pleasing to the eyes, and the tree was desirable for gaining wisdom.

So she took some of its fruit and ate it;

and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened,

and they knew that they were naked;

so they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

When they heard the sound of the LORD God walking about in the garden at the breezy time of the day, the man and his wife hid themselves from the LORD God among the trees of the garden.

The LORD God then called to the man and asked him:

"Where are you?"

He answered,

"I heard you in the garden; but I was afraid, because I was naked, so I hid."

Then God asked:

"Who told you that you were naked?

Have you eaten from the tree of which I had forbidden you to eat?" The man replied,

"The woman whom you put here with me she gave me fruit from the tree, so I ate it."

The Second Lesson: Isaiah's prophesy of a new-born king is fulfilled in Jesus Christ

In this reading,

the prophet Isaiah addresses a people who are gloomy, who walk in darkness.

Isaiah was encouraging the people with the promise that God will give them a new king, who would drive out their enemies and unite them.

For us, with the benefit of hindsight,
there is a deeper meaning,
which is especially meaningful at Christmas.

Our Christian tradition understands
that this Prince of Peace in Isaiah's prophecy
is none other than Jesus the Christ
who proclaims himself "the Light of the World."

Paula Penepent:

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light;
Upon those who lived in a land of gloom a light has shone.
You have brought them abundant joy

The Third Lesson: Isaiah stirs hope for a just leader from the descendants of King David

Before David was king,

he was chosen for his role from among his brothers, who were all sons of a man named Jesse in the town of Bethlehem. So when Isaiah speaks of a shoot sprouting from the stump of Jesse, he means a new king who is a descendent of Jesse and King David. Isaiah says from the stump that remains from the family tree of Jesse, there will indeed be new growth:

A promising shoot that will grow and blossom, producing a wise, and strong, and glorious leader, who will finally bring peace and justice to his people.

Reader 3:

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom.

The spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him: a spirit of wisdom and of understanding, A spirit of counsel and of strength, a spirit of knowledge and of fear of the LORD, and his delight shall be the fear of the LORD.

Not by appearance shall he judge, nor by hearsay shall he decide,

But he shall judge the poor with justice, and decide fairly for the land's afflicted.

He shall strike the ruthless with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall slay the wicked.

Justice shall be the band around his waist, and faithfulness a belt upon his hips.

Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the young goat;

The calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them.

The cow and the bear shall graze,

together their young shall lie down; the lion shall eat hay like the ox.

The baby shall play by the viper's den, and the child lay his hand on the adder's lair.

They shall not harm or destroy on all my holy mountain;

for the earth shall be filled with knowledge of the LORD, as water covers the sea.

The Fourth Lesson: Jeremiah predicts the rise of a just shepherd

Jeremiah was a prophet that lived about seven centuries before Christ. He preached that the people of Judah, the Southern Kingdom, needed and deserved better leadership.

In this reading, Jeremiah predicts the rise of a new and good shepherd of the people

in the family line of King David. We here today have the benefit of knowing about Jesus the Messiah,

the Son of God,
who suffered and died
so that the Israelites,
and indeed the people of all nations

could be saved from the consequences of their sinfulness.

*This* is the Jesus who we celebrate at Christmas.

Reader 4:

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah.

See, days are coming—oracle of the LORD —

when I will raise up a righteous branch for David;

As king he shall reign and govern wisely,

he shall do what is just and right in the land.

In his days Judah shall be saved,

Israel shall dwell in security.

This is the name to be given him:

"The LORD our justice."

Therefore, the days are coming—oracle of the LORD —

"As the LORD lives,

who brought the Israelites out of the land of Egypt";

but rather,

"As the LORD lives,

to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary.

And coming to her, he said,

"Hail, favored one! The Lord is with you."

But she was greatly troubled at what was said

and pondered what sort of greeting this might be.

Then the angel said to her,

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.

Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus.

Seventh Lesson: The magi honor a newborn king, while Herod is worries about a new rival

The magi came to Jerusalem to honor what appeared to be a newborn king.

King Herod, and indeed all of Jerusalem, were troubled by this news of a newborn king.

According to a Jewish legend about the child Moses, some sacred scribes warned *Pharoah* about the imminent birth of one who would deliver the Israelites from *Egypt*.

When they saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted.


